16 Unique Creative Projects to Reuse Your Old PC BY TINA SIEBER UPDATED NOV 16, 2021 Got an old PC knocking about and don't want to throw it away? Here are some amazing ways to repurpose and reuse an old computer.



Here are several DIY projects to repurpose and reuse an old PC, laptop, screens, and other accessories. We've also thrown in some ways to trade in your old hardware or turn it into cash.

(This list is edited to eliminate the "far-out-there" ideas and save some time in this talk.)

1. Media Center



One of the most useful things you can do with an old PC is to move it into your living room and repurpose it as a media center. You can watch movies and TV, listen to music, and play games by installing and setting up Kodi or similar software on your machine.

A nice benefit is that media center software is lightweight and doesn't require a lot of system resources, so you can use it even on very old hardware.

I know some people who have Windows Media Center PCs still up and running from the Windows Home Server days. Windows Home Server is no longer supported by Microsoft, but an Open Source fork has been created. It is still maintained, though I'm not sure I would trust the security patch status of the project. When Windows 7 went out of support, such projects became increasingly risky if they connect to the Internet. Connecting to the Internet is basically the point of setting up a Media Center PC.

These days, it's better to go with Linux and Kodi for your Media PC setup. Or, build your box with the Plex Server software package which is used in the Silicon Dust Home Run HD dedicated media box. (Plex is paid software, but it has a lot more channels already set up for you than Kodi. <u>And a really nice Program Guide.</u>)

3. Build a Home Server



You can use your old PC to host your media and other files and access them whenever you need. This is handy if you only have a limited amount of hard drive space on your new PC.

You can also give access to the home servers to other users on your network, allowing you to share your files with them.

Media Center and Home Server are closely related types of projects. But whereas the old Windows 7 Media Center is defunct, you can still use either Windows or Linux server editions to create and set up your Home Server.

A server is great for file storage and backup for a whole house full of PCs. The server itself does not care whether it's Windows or Linux, NTFS or Linux Ext or BTRFS, or whatever. With RAID you have built in redundancy, so a server generally does not need further discrete backup. Windows has something called Pooled Storage, which also provides redundancy.

4. Set Up a Web Server

What if you want to host files on the internet? If you have your own website, you can host your site yourself from home instead of paying for hosting or using free hosts, which can be bad for your site. Again, you can use Windows or Linux for a Web Host server.

6. PC Testing Rig



If you build PCs often, or if you frequently benchmark components, then a test rig is extremely useful to have on hand. You can use the extra PC to test software, OS upgrades, or hardware, without endangering your production PC or disrupting your ongoing work (and Zoom meetings).

Testing Linux, testing older Windows environments, trying out new software and testing for fatal bugs. Trying out new hardware configurations (including peripherals). Many things you wouldn't want to do on your everyday workhorse PC.

10. Home Security System



If you have a simple webcam, you can connect it to your old PC to make your own home security system. Using software that detects motion and triggers an alert, you can get a notification or set off an alarm if there is unexpected movement in your home.

MUO has a tutorial on how to turn your computer into a video surveillance system. (This tutorial will step you through setup and the specialized software you will need for a home security system.)

The best part of D-I-Y security is you don't depend on a web service or a paid contract to keep your home secure. One down side is you will not have dedicated external monitoring.

Things To Do With An Old PC 13. Create an External Hard Drive



Reuse Parts -- Hard Drive (Also, memory, SSD, peripheral cards)

You don't have to reuse your entire computer. Many of the parts make great DIY projects all by themselves. So if parts of your PC are broken beyond repair, salvage what you can and put it to good use.
